State Police Communications system will be made available for two way radio contacts with snow plows of the State Highway Department. This is a new inovation for New Jersey and will aid greatly for quick dispatch of Highway Department equipment to the scene of heavy snow fall or prior to blizzard weather which may be contemplated in a designated area. The Civil Aeronautica Administration has recently announced that they are prepared to spend a considerable amount in conjuction with local authorities on improvements at Marcer Field, which is


MEMBERSHIP


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

Harry Hemphill, W3EFM of Atlantic City has moved to Plainfield, N. .N.J. and is employed by the Western Electric Co.


W3ZI "CRASHED" NAVAL AIR STATION BY-W3EED

- EDITORIAL-

The development of light weight portable short-range radio communications equipment of the "Walkie-Talkie" type has opened the door to a larger variety of new private applications of radio. Recently the FCC proposed to allocate a new band of frequencies from 460 to 470 Mcs. to private interests, to be known as the "CITIZENS RADIOCOMMUNICATION SERVICE".

The possible uses of this service are as broad as the imaginction of the public and the ingenuity of equipment manufacturers can devise. The Citizens Radiocommunication band can be used, for example to establish a physicians calling service, thru which a central calling exchange in each city can reach doctors while they are enroute in their communication to and from trucks, tractors and other mobile units operating in and around large industrial plants and construction projects. It can be used on farms and ranches for communication to and from men in the fields, on board harbor and river craft, in mountain and swamp areas. Sportsmen and explorers can use it to maintain contact with camps and to decrease the hazards of hunting, fishing, boating and mountain climbing:

The essence of this new service is that it will be widely available. Accordingly, only the minimum requirements of the Communications act plus a few traffic rules will be set up. To procure a license an applicant need only show familiarity with the relevent portions of the radio laws and regulations governing this service. No technical knowledge will be required. By keeping the rules and regulations to a minimum the FCC hopes to encourage ingenuity in design and utilization.

It would appear to us that a dream may have come true and that two way radio communications will be available to all, within a very short time.

DVRA PAST PRISIDENT AWARDED BRONZE ST.R

Major Samuel S. Kale, WIVE, former Past President and Director of the DVRA, has been avarded the Bronze Star Medal for his outstanding service as Frecutive Officer of the 95th Armored Field Artillery Buttalion on the Western Front.

The citation stated that Sam, "through his untiring performance of duty has been of great value to the Battalion in the successful completetion of its missions. One of the many hazardous tasks done on his own initiative was performed on the morning of September 19th, in the vicinity of Gruchen, Germany. Kale made a reconnaissance in the area of Biosdorf, which at the time was occupied by the enemy. In order to make the reconnaissance it was necessary to advance and return thru enemy fire. The aggressive and heroic action on the part of Kale and the information obtained from it, was instrumental in keeping the entire Battalion from marching into a trap". So there you have it men. Looks as though "Our Sam" is in order for Congratulations all around.

However results were not the same as he had previously enjoyed up in the mountains of North Jersey so the W3CKY beam was dismantled just prior to the war. Frank hopes some day to have a bigger and better rig as the spark of ham radio is still ready to assert itself.

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


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EDITORIAL

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STANDING COMMITTEES

EDITORIAL

According to a brief filed with the Federal Communicatios Commission by the American Radio Relay League on June 12th, 1945 in the matter of allocation of frequencies to the various classes of non-governmental services in the radio spectrum, it would look as though the amateur will, if accepted by the Commission, retain just about all of their former operating frequencies in use prior to our entry into the war.

Most of the controversy centers around our 160 meter band, which at the present tile is being occupied by a secret war-time navigational aid necessary to the war effort. However it is beloived by ARRL officials that the need for this sid will no longer exist or may be moved to a different part of the spectrum, come peace, thus the way will remain open for the return of these frequencies to the amateurs. Our Leaque is still holding out strongly in this respect and the shances appear quite good, that we will regain the 160 meter band in full as soon as the Government has not further use for it.

As regards our 80, 40, and 20 meter bands, the proposal recommends that they be retained in full, and that no further reduction be permitted. This is sure good news for the most of us who before the war found our greatest interest and pleasure centered here. It seems a slight reduction of the 10 meter band will be forthcoming, but in lieu of this an allocation in the region between 21,000 and 21,500 kc. has been requested. This particular spot in the spectrum should provide a very interesting region for study and experimentation, and may well become one of our most used and important communication frequencies of the future.



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
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
NEW TUBES IMPROVED CIRCUITS HIGHER FREQUENCIES BETTER ANTENNAS MORE OPERATORS AM-FM-TV



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STANDING COMMITTEES

On June 27th, the Federal Communications Commission made its final decision on its frequency allocation proposals for the hotly Contested "FM" Broadcast Bands. It has finally been decided that the FM allocations will have to move even higher up in frequency Than previously recommended. Frequency Modulation will take up its new position in the sector between 92 and 106 megacycles, instead of the earlier recommendation at 84 to 102 megacycles. This has been quite a blow to the FM industry as present FM sets are constructed to receive in the 44 to 50 megacycle sector. It was argued that such a great change would force the junking of all presant days receivers, and would prolong the industries' return to postwar manufacturing. They also argued that it was not necessary to move FM into the higher frequencies as FM was well established where it is at present. However FCC countered with the argument that such a move was necessary to minimize certain transmission factors. This statement has never been proven but the assignment has been made, and FM will have to work out its own problems from here on out. Whether the new move will be a wise one, only the future can decide.

This final allocation of frequencies has also permanently placed our new 5 meter amateur band. We were to be assigned one of three places between 44 and 60 megacycles, all depending on where Television and FM would finally land. The outcome of all this now is that the amateur 5 meter band will be sandwiched in between the new television assignments, that is between television channel #1 and channel #2. It should not be too difficult to re-adjust our present transmitters to this slightly lower frequency of 50 to 54 Mc, in fact some very interesting work is still to be accomplished

on the good old 5 meter band.

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
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
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
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EDITORIAL



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






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EDITORIAL

There seems to be a mad scramble to get some sort of a rig on the air mow that the FCC has announced the reactivation of the 2 1 meter band as of August 21st. Quite a number of local boys have been heard on the air to date, and it is the intention of the club to procure equipment so that W3AQ may put into operation again. As this seems to be the wishes of the majority of the membership, plans are being made to do so.

The FCC has announced beginning November 15th it is expected the new amateur band from 144 to 148 megacycles will be open for transmission, and in all probability the band from 50 to 54 megacyles will also be re-opened. If this is the case some provision will have to be made to change over our rigs to these new frequencies. There should be lets for a to think about now that we are on the eve of another new ora of Amateur Radio.

We have no definate commitment from the FCC as to when the lower frequencies will be available to the amateur, but they have stated "as soon as other services new operating in these sectors are vacated by the present users, frequency allocations will be made available to the amateur". This is encouraging, but it may be months before this situation is entirely eleared up. So we will just have to hang on and wait for developments.

All amateur radic licenses which were valid during the period Dec. 7th, 1941 to Sept. 15th, 1942, and which have not been revoked, are reistated for a period commencing August 21, 1945 and ending at 3 AM November 15th, 1945.

ELECTION COMING UP

We should like to remind you that the Delaware Valley Radio Assn. and the South Jersey Radio Assn. of Camden, are both sponsoring as candidate for the office of Atlantic Division Director, ARRL, a very capable and faithful servant of Amateur Radio for many years. Ballots will be mailed from ARRL Headquarters during the first week in October, and we earnestly ask your ecoperation and support of our candidate ED G. RASER, WZZI at cloction time.

His radio background dates back to as early as 1912, when he was quite permanently "bitten by the bug", after observing the old 5 KW Marconi crashing spark transmitter at the "WHE", then located on top the Wanamaker Store in Philadelphia. In no time at all he was listening to "NAI" because Island Navy Yard, "punching" his own crystal detector. He went on the air with his first transmitter in 1914 with a half inch Ford spark coil under the call letters of "RE" Although at toat time few thought it necessary to become licensed, it was Ed's ambition to receive the coveted "blue ticket", and in 1915 we find him journeying to Philadelphia Navy Yard for his exam. He left the same day with a crisp new license signed by S.S.Payne, Lieut. U.S.Navy, who was examining officer at that time. "3NG" were the call letters drawn, but any call would have seemed like "sweet music" to the budding ham. Various spark systems followed, from the 1/2 KW rotary, to the nice smooth synchronous note of the big 1 KW.

1/2 KW rotary, to the nice smooth synchronous note of the big 1 kW.

Then came the war, and all amteur stations were closed by order of the Government. Unable to stand it any longer Ed enlisted in the Naval Radio Service, and served at many stations including NAI, NSD, Naval Air Station, Cape May and various listening posts and compass stations throughout the 4th. Naval District. From 1919 to 1922 found him aboard ship as radio operator for the U.S. Shipping Board, Southern S.S. Co., and later with the Colombian Line, and United Fruit Co. After some 5 years as pioncer broadcast engineer from 1923 on, he entered the radio sales and service business as a senior

pattner.

Military communications seemed tohave been his greatest hobby, for he served 9 years with Eqts. Battery, 112th. Field Artillery as Regimental Signal Sergeans. In 1936 he requested, and was granted transfer to the 119th. Observation Sqdn. Air Corps. He was Communications Chief of the squadron for the next 5 years, until 1940 where-

upon he received an honorable discharge from the service.

In the meantime Ed re-organized the N.J. State Not of the Army Amatuer Radio System, which at that time only consisted of a handful of radiomen. It was a long up hill struggle, over a period of many years before this net became, as it so happened, a highly efficient system of rapid traffic handeling networks, in N.J. Then followed a series of appointments from Local Net Control, State NCS and now to State Radio Aide for N.J. As route manager for ARRL, he was also very active in the Southern N.J. Section Net tieing in these networks with that of the AARS, which was an ideal condition.

Ed has held and still holds many appointments such as City Manager, District Supt. for S.N.J. (New SCM) OBS, OFS, RM, OBS, and Asst. SCM for So.N.J. Section, ARRL. He is a pioneer member of the ARRL since 1915 and still has all his copies of QST right thru to the present date. He is a member of the Besic Amateur Emergency Corps and holds membership in the IARU, ROWH, RCG, VNOA, 20 Year Club, and

the A-l Operator Club. In:1939 he acheived the "WAS AWARD" accomplished entirely on the 80 Meter Band. There are only a few of these we are told. In March 1940 while operating radio communications in in military aircraft working with an agateur station on the ground, he was awarded the "ABRL PUBLIC SERVICE CERTIFICATE" for outstanding work in connection with the search for a lost child.

In other active radio groups, Ed was past Secretary of the Central YMCA Radio Club, Trenton Ladio Assn. (1923) and for many years Secretary of the Delaware Valley Radio Assn. up to the present date. He is also an associate member of the IRE, and a full member of the Veteran Wireless Operators Assn., and organization of pioneer radio operators. He is now employed as a communications engineer in the Radio Division, N.J. State Police, and prior to that was engaged in research and development work for the Signal Corps Laboratories, at Fort Monmouth, N.J.
